Topic: Setting Global Standards for International Intervention to Ensure Global Safety and the Protection of Human Rights

GENERAL ASSEMBLY

Accepting that human rights are vital for world prosperity and citizen wellbeing,

Understanding the moral hypocrisy of military or physical intervention as to ensure human rights,

Recalling the failures of interventions on the behalf of human rights in Iraq, Syria, Yemen and Afghanistan,

Deeply Concerned by growing wealth inequality and the growing power of capitalist classes and their effects on human rights,

Observing Human rights violations by western countries and so called protectors of human rights,

Stressing the individual sovereignty of each member states,

Supports the universal declaration of human rights,

Noting in mind and appreciating different Ideologies, cultures and understandings of what constitutes human rights,

Emphasizing that western values are not necessarily universal,

Bearing in mind the non binding nature of the UN declaration of Human Rights,

Recommending a regular case study of all nations in the world by the UNHRC to ensure human rights are being put in order,

Calling against all states which do not put in order the Universal Declaration of Human Rights,

1. Strongly recommends that all of the countries that, under international standards and criteria, recognize the abuse of human rights in another country, impose strict sanctions in order for the issue to be recognized by the abusing country, change to be sought and human rights to consequently be restored;
2. Expresses its hope in educating the population about how to act in sexual violence situations:

 - i. Protect their personal data, so they feel safe enough to testify without the fear of being the next victim of the assailant without hesitating,
 - ii. Taking the witness to another room if is requested so they feel safer to testify,
 - d. Call the police if you feel assaulted or you have been sexually assaulted or raped, and
 - e. Make a hotline to rapist and around nations have specific phone booths for rape and sexual assaults so if someone is in danger the call goes directly to the police station;
2. Affirms that countries, NGO's and all other relevant entities should respect the sovereignty and stability of each individual member state;
 3. Strongly Urges countries address economic human rights in ways such as but not limited to:
 - a. Redistributing Economic resources towards economically poorer stratas of society,
 - b. Empowering Trade Unions and other labour organizations as to better protect workers rights,
 - c. Changing or reforming Capitalist economies to better serve workers, and
 - d. Nationalizing Key Economic sectors and resources such as but not limited to:
 - i. Utilities,
 - ii. Military Industrial Complexes,
 - iii. Prison Systems, and
 - iv. Key Industries;
 4. Demands countries address economic human rights in ways such as but not limited to:
 - a. Redistributing Economic resources towards economically poorer stratas of society,
 - b. Nationalizing Key Economic sectors and resources such as but not limited to:
 - v. Utilities,
 - vi. Military Industrial Complexes,
 - vii. Prison Systems, and
 - viii. Key Industries;

5. Suggests countries implement socialist economic reforms to ensure third generation human rights in ways such as but not limited to:

- e. Offering Free Universal Health care to all citizens,
- f. Offering Free Universal Education to all Citizens,
- g. Ensuring access to clean running water and electricity, and
- h. Ensuring general Stability and safety within their countries;

6. Condemns action against civil population which include:

- a. trade embargoes,
- b. military or forceful action, and
- c. strong economic sanctions.
